Re: Child Care Budget Priorities

Dear Governor Hochul:

Thank you for prioritizing child care as Governor, and throughout your career as an elected official. Under your leadership as Governor, we've achieved historic expansions to child care assistance, making tens of thousands more New York families able to access high-quality child care compared to when you became Governor. In this year's Executive Budget, we applaud the inclusion of significant new state funds to sustain those expansions to child care assistance. Yet, families continue to leave our state, in large part because they cannot afford to live and work here, with child care among those costs driving them away.

There are still many New York families — disproportionately low-income, Black, brown and immigrant families — who face unscalable barriers to accessing child care assistance; among them, families where parents work unpredictable or fluctuating work hours and families whose children are denied care due solely to their immigration status. Another barrier: the severe and growing child care workforce shortage due to low wages is leading to reduced capacity, just as more families are able to afford care.

To ensure the promise of the State's historic expansions to child care assistance is realized, *New York leaders must create a permanent, substantial compensation supplement for the child care workforce in this year's state budget and take aim at barriers that have disproportionately kept low-income, immigrant, and Black and brown New York families from accessing child care assistance* including the state's long-standing and inequitable rule of tying child care assistance to caretakers' exact hours of work.

The undersigned New York parents, child care providers, child and family advocates, and provider networks—all members of the Empire State Campaign for Child Care—call on you to adopt and expand upon the following proposals included in the 2024-25 legislative one-house budget proposals. Without the inclusion of these proposals, the final budget will perpetuate inequitable barriers that keep too many of the families who need child care assistance most from accessing it, and will cause many members of the state's desperately underpaid child care workforce to experience a pay cut in the coming year.

• Adopt the Senate and the Assembly one-house budget proposals to include \$220 million in additional funds for the child care workforce bringing the total investment in the workforce to \$500 million. This falls short of what the sector needs, but is an important investment.

- Add language making the workforce compensation support permanent. The Senate
 resolution indicates an intention to make the investment in the workforce ongoing.
 Providers cannot recruit or retain educators with one-time bonuses, and the field cannot
 begin to create a pipeline of new members to the workforce without the promise of
 ongoing supplements.
- Adopt the proposal included in both houses' budgets (but not the Executive) to ensure that the many parents who work variable hours in retail, the trades, the gig economy and restaurants can access child care by ending the state's practice of tying child care assistance to caretakers' exact hours of work (decoupling). Legislation to end this practice has been passed by the Legislature twice, most recently in December 2023, when it was vetoed with the message that it was an issue that needed to be addressed by the Legislature in the budget. We urge and expect that the final budget will once and for all end this inequitable practice that leaves many of the State's essential workers from being able to access child care assistance.
- Adopt the proposal included in both houses' budgets (but not the Executive) to increase the rate paid to child care providers for serving families experiencing homelessness, and families that need care during non-traditional hours, with a preference for the Assembly budget proposal requiring all counties to set the rate at a 15% differential.
- Adopt the Senate's proposal to expand the pilot projects commenced last year to provide scholarships to families needing child care who are ineligible for the statewide child care assistance program due to the child's immigration status, or the episodic nature of the parents' work schedule.

The passage of a budget that includes these one-house proposals will move New York decisively down the path to creating a strong and sustainable child care system, and a New York that is truly affordable for all the State's families.
